



#### **Home Buying Myths**

Home buyers get a lot of advice from friends and family - some good, some bad. These myths can negatively guide their home purchasing experience. Realtor.com warns buyers not to fall for one of these common buying falsehoods.

The only upfront cost is the down payment. Buyers need to be prepared for several expenses – everything from fees, taxes, costs for inspections, credit reports, mortgage insurance, and others. Closing costs can be anywhere from 5 percent to 9 percent of the purchase price in Michigan.

Just looking for a house casually is not a big deal. Some people may want to just start looking at homes to get a feel for the area, before they even sit down with a REALTOR®. But they could be setting themselves up for major heartbreak. A buyer might be viewing homes that are not in the price range where they qualify. Home shoppers should get pre-approved for a mortgage from the start so they know their budget and don't waste time looking at homes that are not in their price range, either too high or too low.

You must have a 20 percent down payment. With a 20 percent down payment buyers avoid paying private mortgage insurance. But 20 percent down isn't required. There are also many options for down payment assistance that lenders can explore with a buyer who has limited funds.

You don't need a home inspection. When the housing market is extremely competitive, some home shoppers may be willing to waive the home inspection in order to get the home they want. But beware: some sellers are banking on your skipping this crucial step. It means you may be taking on problems that can be found by a licensed inspector and addressed prior to the purchase. #### Meet your neighbor...

Shirley has lived in the 1100 block of Hazen for over 30 years. She moved into the neighborhood with her two young sons. She purchased the house on Hazen to put down roots for her family. She was the first African American on her street. When she bought the house on Hazen she was one of about three families that had children. Most of the street consisted of retired couples and all the traffic on the street was from those who lived on the street. She felt comfortable and safe in her new home. She took her boys to Cheseboro Park to play and they attended St. Stephen's through middle school and graduated from Ottawa Hills High School.

Shirley spoke of her wonderful neighbors and shared a story of Mrs. Jones who stood up for Shirley and her boys when another neighbor was not very welcoming. Being the first African American did make it difficult to break into the neighborhood.



Shirley was born in the south and moved to Grand Rapids when she was two years old with her family. She has a Masters of Social Work from Grand Valley. She worked as the Director of Head Start for Kent County and at the Grand Rapids Child Guidance Center (now Arbor Circle). She is now retired and enjoying time with her grandchildren. She still feels comfortable and safe in the

neighborhood and likes to get out and shovel and take care of her yard. As the longest resident on the street she takes time to introduce herself to new neighbors and let them know that it's a good, friendly and safe neighborhood. She has an appreciation for neighbors and their passions.

Shirley is only the third owner of her home. She had the unique opportunity to meet the original owner who had the house built when he stopped by and knocked on the door. He was impressed with how well she had maintained the home. She was able to ask why they didn't add a dining room when there was plenty of room to do so. The original owner decided they wanted a bigger yard rather than a larger home.


#### **National Night Out Update**

Let's keep an eye out for each other and report any suspicious persons, activities or vehicles to the police, at the non-emergency number 616-456-3400, or if a crime is being committed call the police at 911.

We have had a number of larcenies from vehicles this Spring and Summer due to vehicles being unlocked with valuables or other items left in them. Don't forget to take all valuables out of your vehicles. Do not leave any cords or window holders in the open and lock your vehicle when not in use. Approximately 95% of all car larcenies are with vehicles not locked with valuable in them.

**Don't leave your equipment out** in the yard or garage door open if you are not in full site. These are open invitations for someone to enter quickly and take something.

Please lock your doors and windows in your home when not at home and at night. Leave your outside lights on from dusk till dawn.

Most solicitors generally do not get a license so they are operating illegally.

The phrase "transient merchant" shall mean any "canvasser", "peddler", "solicitor", or "transient vendor".




