Hello Neighbor. Spring has arrived and I want to encourage you to consider the following good neighboring practices.

- 1. Introduce yourself to someone on your block that you don't know.
- 2. Be conscious of your noise level.
- Keep your dog on a leash, clean up after them and be aware that barking or whining dogs can be a source of contention for neighbors.
- 4. If you're planning a party, be sure to give your neighbors plenty of warning. Letting them know when it will start and end. Leaving your number as a contact may also be helpful. Just in case there is a need for you to turn it down, they can call you instead of the non-emergency police number.
- 5. Mow your lawn regularly.
- 6. If you miss the collection day, return your receptacle to your property and try to keep it contained.
- 7. Look out for your neighbors. When you see suspicious activity, call the police.
- 8. Look for opportunities to connect with your neighbor. Have them over for tea/ coffee or participate in the neighborhood garage sales together.
- 9. When someone new is moving next to you, welcome them with cookies, a jug of lemonade or some other small gesture of hospitality.



FOR THE BIRDS

Spring is here and we are getting out

to clean the yard. It's time to take care of the wild birds as well. Many species are returning (including hummingbirds!). All the following tasks can be done by the whole family. Attracting wild birds is easy: offer them a water source. Water is essential for drinking and for preening or cleaning oils from their feathers. Birdbaths can add nicely to a yard's decor, but a



simple raised bowl will work. Use a few inches of water, and add a rock to give the birds depth perception, and a place to perch of needed. This will attract as many birds as seeds or suet.

Black Oil Sunflower seeds are the favorite of the greatest variety of wild bird species like cardinals, nuthatches and chickadees. Nyjer (or thistle) seed will attract finches and smaller songbirds. Offer nuts for woodpeckers and Blue Jays. Hummers require nectar, which is easy to make at home. Mixing instructions are readily available.



Hang your feeder from a tree branch six feet high and six feet from the base of the tree. Make sure there is cover overhead for protection from hawks and a quick escape spot like inner tree branches or bushes. Birds are at their most vulnerable when they visit a feeder to eat. Help them stay safe.

Clean old nest matter out of bird houses each season with mild soap, thoroughly rinse and dry. This prevents mites and other pests from attacking a new nest. Clean your feeder in the same manner.

For bird i.d., I recommend the free app from Cornell Lab of Ornithology, called "Merlin Bird ID". Easy to use, lots of info on range and food preferences, and sounds of each bird

are included! With a little effort, you can enjoy the beautiful colors and songs of backyard birds.

Street Smarts IS IT SAFE TO WALK OR RUN?

Don't wear headphones, Go with another runner/walker, Don't zone out, Bring a cell phone, Don't hesitate to call the police, Don't hesitate to go up to a home or business for help, Vary your routes, Run/walk in familiar areas, Stay aware of your surroundings, Stay out of heavily foliated areas, .

SAFETY AT THE DOOR

Knock, Knock ... who's there? You open your door to a woman who is clearly upset. She says she just had an accident around the corner and needs to get her car towed. The tow costs \$35 and she is short \$15. She says she's your neighbor, "You see my little boy riding his bike up and down the street all the time." She will pay you back as soon as her husband gets home. If she is given cash she has been known to come back for more about a half-hour later. She is a known prostitute with a crack problem. The cash goes for drugs.

Door to door panhandlers often plague urban areas. In Grand Rapids people knock on doors asking for cash for an emergency at any time during the day or night. They are vary convincing and it is very difficult to turn them away. Men and women panhandle in residential neighborhoods. According to many police reports the panhandlers admit that the money is spent on drugs or alcohol. They are addicts and this is relatively easy way to get cash.

As an adult you can make your own decision about how to handle panhandlers, but crime prevention experts suggest never giving out cash at the door for any reason. Panhandlers will often ask to use your phone. You should refuse or you can close and lock the door and make the call for them. Generally they just want to get in so you will have to give them the cash to get rid of them.

What to tell your children? Do they answer the door themselves? Do they answer the door when an adult is not home. Do they know what to do if a stranger comes to the door and presents an emergency situation and asks to use the phone?

Here is what we think will keep you and your kids safer: Keep the main door locked when you are not in the room. To use a storm/ screened door, make sure it has a lock, and get an inexpensive door alarm that will alert you when the door is opened. It is risky to leave any door unlocked when you are nearby.

Don't let children answer the door when at home alone. Even young teens should have an adult nearby if they answer the door. Explain that the panhandlers are men and women who go door to door with a made up story to get money. Tell the children if people need help you will call the police for them. Tell them to never let a stranger in your home. Children should never get into a conversation with a panhandler.

TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS:

Recent books stress the importance of using our innate survival instincts. When the hair on the back of your neck stands up and every nerve is alive, don't push away your fear and think you are just being paranoid. Evolution has not totally dampened our "fight or flight instinct". It would be wise to take advantage of it when it kicks in and listen to what your mind and body are telling you.






Coloring Corner ...







All you need for this easy activity is a glass jar or bottle, some cotton wool balls/ wads and a bean!

First, stuff cotton wool balls into a glass jam jar. Then, simply stick one bean on either side of the jar so that you can watch 2 growing at once. You can use butter beans straight out can be purchased

wherever garden supplies are sold). Next, gently add water until the cotton wool gets damp, but not too wet, and place the jar in the window.


Within 2-3 days the beans will start to sprout a small root, and 2-3 days later you will see little tendrils growing. Another 4-5 days and the beans develope a large network of shoots coming off the main root, and a sturdy stem will grow straight upwards and above the top of the cotton wool. The shrivelled husk of the bean skin will probably drop off and it will appear ready to open up! Just a day or so later and dark green leaves will begin to unfurl. And finally, after 4-5 more days, the beans should be growing very steadily; tall and spindly with large leaves seeking out more sunlight.

Carefully remove them from the jar and examine the complex network of roots that have, by this time, entangled themselves around the cotton wool balls at the bottom. Gently unwind the roots from the cotton wool and replant the beans into soil in pots in the garden. Be sure to water them and you can watch their rapid growth out in the garden!

Summer of Construction

Plan for longer travel times and detours this summer as the city prepares for reconstruction and repaving on Eastern Ave from Burton to 28th Street. While this is an inconvenient project for many, it is necessary to keep the road in good repair. The section of Eastern through Alger Heights sees on average 15,500 vehicles per day. There are 75 driveways and 10 bus stops in the area.

The city presented the current plans for the project at a February meeting at Alger Park Church. Currently, Eastern will be repaved from the south side of the intersection with Burton to the north side of the intersection with 28th Street. The section between 28th Street and Walsh will be completely reconstructed with underground utilities being replaced. All of the sidewalk ramps and associated curbs throughout the construction zone will be replaced and upgraded to current ADA standards.

The intersection of Eastern and Alger will also be reconstructed as the road surface and subsurface has begun to fail. There will be times when traffic will not be able to travel east and west across Eastern on Alger.

The project will begin in June and may last as long as September or early October for the finishing touches. It will be split into four stages. During the Stage 1, Eastern will be reduced to two lanes while sidewalk ramps and curbs are rebuilt on the east side of the road. For Stage 2, traffic will be shifted to the other side of the road for work on the sidewalks and curbs on the west side of the road. Both Stages 3 and 4 will require Eastern being reduced to one-way traffic while the road surface is rebuilt. Stage 3 will have traffic travelling southbound only while Stage 4 will have traffic travelling northbound only. The suggested detour for traffic while part of the road is closed will be via Madison Avenue.

Other changes that come with the project is the addition of a pedestrian island toward the south end of the Alger Height Business District along with several rain gardens and filtration basins for rainwater runoff. The rain gardens and filtration basins will be built between the road and sidewalks in select locations that have not been fully determined yet.

Work during the days will probably begin as early as 7am and conclude no later than 6pm. Access to Everglade will be maintained at all times through the area of full reconstruction near 28th Street. There are no tree removals planned as the city wants to preserve the mature tree canopy over the road. At the conclusion of the project, the road footprint will be the same as it is currently.

With some patience and flexibility, the work will pass by with no problem and we will all have a much nicer road to use for the future.

"Solicitor" means any person who, while on a public street or while in a public place, offers for sale, takes orders for or attempts to take orders for the retail sale of any goods, personal property or whatsoever for future delivery, they must have a transient license issued by the City of Grand Rapids. Most solicitors generally do not get a license so they are operating illegally.

The phrase "transient merchant" shall mean any "canvasser", "peddler", "solicitor", or "transient vendor".

- Recognition in the newsletter


Business/Family Level -


